Mayor and Council,

Summer will be here before you know it, although it hasn't been feeling like it! This summer will feature our 17th annual Manitoulin Country Fest and 6th annual Rockin' The Rock festival (pandemic times included). We wanted to begin by thanking the Town of NEMI for your continued support of our summer plans. It would be very challenging for us to deliver these events as "seamlessly" as we do without your support - so THANK YOU!

Both of these events bring in thousands of tourists into our community resulting in increased spending overall. However, hosting of these two festivals is not without risk. Should we experience a bad year with weather or loss of some of our sponsorship dollars, we could be just one day away from having to shut them down. It is critical for us to continue to foster our relationships to ensure continued success for everyone.

We will again be offering our patrons the opportunity to camp for the week between RTR and MCF FREE OF CHARGE! This is done to facilitate our patrons not having to drive back and forth as well as reduce additional traffic on Harbour View Road. This 7-10 additional days of tourist dollars, further drives economics during the week as they will be eating in our restaurants, shopping at our retail outlets and taking in the sites and sounds of Manitoulin.

We stand before you today to request:

RTR - ROCKIN' THE ROCK

- 1. Designate the event one of municipal significance;
- 2. Placement of directional signs on municipal property starting Tuesday, August 8th with removal no later than Tuesday, August 22nd;
- 3. Access to showers at the NEMI Rec Centre for our patrons to shower Saturday 8am until noon. The use of the showers would be provided on a donation basis from the patrons directly; and
- 4. Inclusion of RTR on the Town of NEMI LED sign, inclusion in NEMI website and NEMI marketing.

MCF - MANITOULIN COUNTRY FEST

- Designate that event one of municipal significance;
- 2. Beer tent curfew until 1:00am (as in the past several years) Thursday, August 17th, Friday, August 18th and Saturday, August 19th;
- Donation and use of the chain link fencing utilized in conjunction with the cruise ships (if available) delivery by Thursday, August 16th (early morning if possible) and returned Tuesday, August 22nd;
- 4. Donation of use of the Rendevous Pavilion on Wednesday, August 16th from 4pm until 7pm for our fundraising dinner. All funds raised on that evening are donated to a local

- initiative. To date we have contributed in excess of \$39,500 to community based organizations from this boat cruise;
- 5. Approval to utilize the Arena parking lot, town parking lot by the LCBO on Thursday evening, Friday and Saturday for overflow parking, assuming the arena is not rented;
- 6. Access to showers at the NEMI Rec Centre for our patrons to shower Friday 8am until noon and Saturday 8am until noon. The use of the showers would be provided on a donation basis from the patrons directly; and
- 7. Inclusion of MCF on the Town of NEMI LED sign, inclusion in NEMI website and NEMI marketing.

In addition to the above, we request the Town supply four nim buckets, free of charge, to be placed on site, Wednesday, August 9th and picked up any time after Tuesday, August 22nd. The schedule for garbage pick up, which will also be provided free of charge, can be determined at a later date with town staff.



A.3 Adaptation planning and implementation has progressed across all sectors and regions, with documented benefits and varying effectiveness. Despite progress, adaptation gaps exist, and will continue to grow at current rates of implementation. Hard and soft limits to adaptation have been reached in some ecosystems and regions. Maladaptation is happening in some sectors and regions. Current global financial flows for adaptation are insufficient for, and constrain implementation of, adaptation options, especially in developing countries (high confidence).

B.1 Continued greenhouse gas emissions will lead to increasing global warming, with the best estimate of reaching 1.5°C in the near term in considered scenarios and modelled pathways. Every increment of global warming will intensify multiple and concurrent hazards (high confidence). Deep, rapid, and sustained reductions in greenhouse gas emissions would lead to a discernible slowdown in global warming within around two decades, and also to discernible changes in atmospheric composition within a few years (high confidence).








Historic Maximum and Minimum Lake Levels





World's Largest Fresh Water Archipelago



THAT the Mayor and proper Officers of the Corporation of the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the recommendations, motions, resolutions, reports, action and other decisions of the Council or Committees as evidenced by the above-mentioned minutes in Section 1 and the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute all necessary documents in the name of the Corporation of the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands and to affix the seal of the Corporation thereto.

Council shall provide input on municipal conditions of approval for consents.

The proposed lot and retained lot shall have frontage and access on to an opened and maintained public road, or have private road or water access in compliance with the policies of this Plan.

MTO's policy is to allow only one highway entrance for each lot of record fronting onto a provincial highway. AMTO will not allow backlots to create a second entrance on the highway. MTO will not support a consent to separate a home-based business from a residential use which would result in separate entrances for the business and residential parcels.

Lots will not be created which would create a traffic hazard due to limited sight lines on curves or grades.

The lot area and frontage of both the lot to be retained and the lot to be severed will be adequate for existing and proposed uses and will allow for the development of a use which is compatible with adjacent uses by providing for sufficient setbacks from neighbouring uses and, where required, the provision of appropriate buffering.

The proposed lot(s) will not restrict the development of other parcels of land, particularly the provision of access to allow the development of remnant parcels in the interior of a block of land.



On March 7, 2023, the Office for the Chief Medical Officer of Health of Ontario released its 2022 Annual Report. With a focus on public health preparedness for infectious disease outbreaks and pandemics, Public Health Sudbury & Districts (Public Health) applauds the Chief Medical Officer of Health for highlighting the importance of public health readiness, collective action and sustained investments in public health required to minimize the physical, mental, social, and economic impacts of future pandemics on individuals, communities, and societies.

As the communities of Sudbury and districts transition through the recovery phase of this pandemic, the Report is a call to action to learn from our experience so we are better prepared to not only protect ourselves, but to also invest in building strong and resilient systems and communities that create opportunities for the best health possible for all.

At its meeting on April 20, 2023, the Board of Health carried the following resolution #19-23:

WHEREAS on March 7, 2023, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health released his 2022 Annual Report titled, Being Ready: Ensuring Public Health Preparedness for Infectious Outbreaks and Pandemic; and

WHEREAS the 2022 Annual Report identified six next steps, including to (1) invest in preparedness, (2) strengthen accountabilities, (3) assess progress, (4) improve the health of Indigenous peoples, (5) improve the health of Black and other racialized populations, and (6) sustain relationships; and

WHEREAS the Board of Health for Public Health Sudbury & Districts is committed to taking local action in support of these next steps and to do so requires sustained provincial investment in public health preparedness over time;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Board of Health for Public Health Sudbury & Districts call on the Government of Ontario and the Ministry of Health to fully support and implement the recommendations outlined in the Chief Medical Officer of Health 2022 Annual Report, including ensuring associated sustained funding for local public health;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board request the Chief Medical Officer of Health to ensure proactive engagement with local public health agencies as work is undertaken to review and strengthen the relevant Ontario Public Health Standards, including the Emergency Management Guidelines;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board share this motion with relevant stakeholders, including area mayors and reeves, local community partners, Ontario boards of health, and provincial partners and agencies.

Members of the Board of Health for Public Health Sudbury & Districts echo the Chief Medical Officer of Health's call to learn from the COVID-19 pandemic and have already embarked on a process to learn from local response efforts. Throughout 2022, both formal and informal opportunities were undertaken to learn

from the agency's experience responding to the pandemic. In June and July of 2022, we also hosted a series of <u>community partner feedback sessions</u> to understand the collective experience in local response and identify opportunities for improvements.

Public Health is committed to ongoing investments in its own readiness, and to supporting the readiness of the public health sector and system, the communities we serve, and society overall. We all have a role to play in public health emergency preparedness, and we look forward to strengthening our relationships and collaborations to foster healthy and equitable communities.
